It's history, culture and interest today is rooted in the establishment of the Trent Severn Waterway that charts a course through the Kawarthas from one famed lift lock in Peterborough to another in Kirkfield. Only 1 - 2 hours from Toronto, this region offers students lakes for water recreation, trails for biking, hiking and cross-country skiing.

Lindsay is one of seventeen communities that make up the larger municipality of the City of Kawartha Lakes. With over 250 lakes and rivers throughout vast stretches of panoramic beauty, Lindsay and the Kawartha Lakes area offers visitors a wealth of leisure activities year round. Rich in culture and heritage, Lindsay boasts beautifully maintained city parks, the winding Scugog River, a variety of entertaining events, and one of the widest Main Streets in Ontario.

- Located on the Scugog River
- Population: approximately 17,000
- 120 km northeast of Toronto, 40 km west of Peterborough

Notable features:

- 2001, the town of Lindsay became part of the larger City of Kawartha Lakes
- Warm, humid summers and cold winters are typical
- Part of the Trent-Severn Waterway, a canal system that links Central Ontario with Lakes Ontario and Huron
- In 2007, Lindsay celebrated its 150th anniversary
- Primary industries include agriculture and tourism
- The Kawartha Dairy is well-known as the producer of the "best ice-cream"
